Introduction

Single Basic Act for Joint Undertakings and thematic priorities for the European Partnerships portfolio in Horizon Europe 28-34

Public Consultation Questionnaire

This open public consultation focuses on the preparation of the **European Partnerships under the new Horizon Europe programme 28-34 (HE 28-34)**. These include Treaty-based partnerships, i.e. Art. 187 TFEU Joint Undertakings (JUs) and Art. 185 TFEU initiatives, and Work Programme-based partnerships (encompassing the existing co-programmed and co-funded partnerships). **For reasons of efficiency, the consultation will cover two complementary strands:** the development of a Single Basic Act for the Joint Undertakings, and the definition of the thematic areas to be addressed within the overall set of European Partnerships, defined as “partnership portfolio”.

Treaty-based partnerships, i.e. Art. 187 TFEU Joint Undertakings (JUs) and Art. 185 TFEU initiatives, are unique instruments in the EU R&I funding landscape that bring together different actors around shared strategic priorities. Industry, Research Performing Organisations, Member States/Associated Countries and the EU pool resources and efforts to foster research, development and deployment of breakthrough technologies and push for system change. By combining and jointly deploying public and private resources, they enable the mobilisation of investments and expertise that go beyond what individual actors could achieve on their own.

Similarly to the situation under the current Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF) the Commission is preparing a single establishing legislative act for Joint Undertakings (hereinafter referred to as the Single Basic Act (SBA)), in the context of the next MFF, notably Article 11(4) of the Commission proposal for a Regulation establishing Horizon Europe 28-34 (HE 28-34). **This public consultation is part of the preparation of this future SBA for JUs and of any potential basic act(s), e.g. to establish Article 185 TFEU initiative(s), under HE 28-34.**

Together with the Work Programme based partnerships, the Art. 187 TFEU JUs and Art. 185 TFEU initiatives will be part of the partnership portfolio, chosen to match the EU's strategic priorities and to avoid gaps or overlap between initiatives. **Therefore, to ensure a coherent approach, the consultation includes a set of questions on the portfolio of partnerships in HE 28-34, beyond Art. 187 TFEU JUs and Art. 185 initiatives.**

Reflecting the work strands outlined above, **the questions in this consultation are structured in three distinct sections:**

The first section refers to Treaty-based partnerships and starts with questions focused on the functioning of current Treaty-based partnerships and potential areas for improvement under the next MFF. It continues with questions on the specific objectives and on the possible policy measures to achieve them.

The second section aims to collect ideas and suggestions on the characteristics of the portfolio of European Partnerships and possible thematic areas to be addressed by partnerships under HE 28-34, irrespective of their implementation type.

The last section of the survey contains a number of questions about the respondents and their relation to European Partnerships, if any.

This public consultation will inform the Impact Assessment of the proposal for the future SBA for JUs and of any potential separate legal act (one or several), for instance, to establish Art.185 TFEU initiatives, as well as also support the ongoing process of building the new portfolio of partnership areas under HE 28-34.

Questions group 1: Views on the areas of improvement

Changed geopolitical conditions and new EU strategic priorities call for increasing efficiency, effectiveness and maximising the impact of Treaty-based partnerships at system level on R&I, competitiveness performance, technological development and industrial deployment. This requires a strategic revision of the partnership landscape and the related enabling conditions, particularly in view of the whole innovation-to-investment journey. This will also account for the link with the European Competitiveness Fund (ECF), which is

aimed at boosting the market uptake of innovative technologies, and may support the partnerships set up under HE 28-34, where necessary to achieve its objectives.

The current MFF has demonstrated the key value of partnerships in aligning strategic agendas, leveraging public and private investment, and building ecosystems around key EU priorities. Therefore, partnerships have been an instrument of strategic importance for boosting Europe's global competitiveness. To ensure that they continue to have a significant impact in a rapidly evolving environment the Commission has identified five potential areas for improvement* – described below –, which will have to be addressed by the future Treaty-based partnerships. As the SBA for JUs under HE 28-34 will aim to define measures to tackle such areas for improvement, the Commission intends to identify the most appropriate and impactful ways to do so:

- Area 1: Treaty-based partnerships do not sufficiently support the development, uptake and/or deployment of new technologies and solutions by EU industry and society
- Area 2: Private co-funding in some Treaty-based partnerships is insufficient to create significant impact
- Area 3: Treaty-based partnerships are not fully aligned with the current EU strategic vision
- Area 4: Cross-fertilisation and knowledge dissemination is low among Treaty-based partnerships, and between Treaty-based partnerships and other publicly funded R&I initiatives
- Area 5: The requirements for membership, participation, and funding access in Treaty-based partnerships are hard to understand and navigate.

**These areas for improvement have been identified in various evaluations and do not necessarily pertain to all existing JUs, but are relevant to some JUs to varying extent.*
